Online Giving Options for Kairos

Ordering Ministry Materials from Kairos

Kairos will soon transition to a new option of ordering ministry materials—the crosses, books and other materials volunteers use to for Kairos Weekends. This change is part of a strategic transformation of outsourcing print production from the Kairos staff.

You may choose to telephone the International office, just like always, and place orders in this way. If that is the case, your order will be placed into an e-commerce system that will do the following:

- Automatically generate an approval email to the appropriate financial secretary.
- Allow for tracking of materials from production (if applicable) through shipping.

You will also have the option of bypassing the telephone and placing orders online directly. In this option the previous options are applicable. In addition, you will order from:

- A single page that lists all the items associated with a particular program (KO, KI, KT)
- Helpful merchandise photos (helping you differentiate between crosses, among other things).
- Save 10% on all orders that **YOU** place through the website.

You may still order supplies with the KPMI Order Form, but only orders completed on the current order form (dated 9.28.12) will be accepted.

KAIROS OUTSIDE- A SAFE PLACE

Just imagine how it feels to get the news that someone from your family has been arrested and will be going to prison for a long time.

A mother might feel shame or embarrassment, that if she had been a better parent, this might not have happened. If you are a wife, you might be worried about how the bills are going to get paid and how your children will survive. If you are a sibling, you might be angry for your family having to go through this pain. Then on top of all these feelings, in most situations, you are afraid to tell anyone outside of the family for fear of judgement. Sometimes your own church could turn their back on you and your family.

Kairos Outside is a place where the women whose lives have been affected by incarceration of a relative or friend, can come and share their stories and their pain. It is a safe place that everyone knows the Guest's "secret" and does not judge her. It is a place that the grace and peace of Jesus Christ is so present that you can see it and touch it through the KO volunteers.

Kairos Outside provides the Guests with a loving, Christian community who walks the journey with them and prays for them in the joyful times and supports them through the painful

times. The Guests are treated as Christ would treat them and life can begin to flow back into their broken hearts.

Kairos Outside provides an ongoing support system for the Guests as they walk this journey of incarceration. These families are sitting in our churches, in our work places, and in our neighbourhoods and we may not even know it. Their lives are tired and heavy burdened and Christ and the KO community give them a safe place of rest and spiritual support.

Kairos Outside is needed in all communities since the numbers of families affected by incarcer-

ation is on the rise. Please consider being a Kairos Outside volunteer or attending a weekend retreat scheduled twice a year.

God blesses the Guests when they have the courage to attend a KO weekend. God also blesses the faithful KO volunteers for believing that Matthew 25:36 about ministering to those in prison applies equally to those who are in prison on the outside, because of the actions of the relatives or friends.

Thank you, God, for caring about all your children, no matter where they are in this world.

WELCOME TO BILL'S BARN

Hello, my friends. School starts are here and maybe the cooler weather is just around the corner. I'm asking two requests of you.

First, go to the website and read an account of the Tamms Ad/Seg Weekend that took place in Illinois last February. It is 26 pages long, but it is absolutely an incredible retelling of the preparations for and the actual events of that Weekend. I dare you not to have a box of Kleenex® on hand.

Second, read the following piece I received as part of the EZRA report entitled *Leader's Comments for Newsletter*. This was turned in by Jim Brizendine of Ohio who led the Number One Weekend at Pickaway CI. Was it a totally perfect Weekend? No, as Jim had to assign 2 Team members to double hosting responsibilities in the 11th hour. But these are his words without any input from this office.

Kairos PCI #1 at Pickaway Correctional Institute has made a tremendous impact on the entire facility. The impact reaches far beyond the 36 participants that experienced the Weekend. The staff; Corrections Officers, the Warden (Brian Cook) and his staff, were involved and committed to the success of this first Weekend.

The Chaplain (Rev. Rhonda Harris) was very involved and her commitment played as much a part in the success as any other single human factor. She is very wise and her experience with Kairos in other institutions was a key factor. Her selection of participants and her dedication to the Weekend (she was there for the entire 40 hours) contributed directly to the Weekend. She was able to diffuse many of the potential issues that came up, especially during a Number One Weekend. She had the institution prepared well in advance of the team's arrival, so that they knew what to expect. Her comments about the Weekend were along the lines of This is the best Kairos I have ever been a part of, the spirituality was by far the best I have experienced on any Kairos or Epiphany Weekend." Chaplain Harris was also involved in the Forgiveness Windup, and her impact was felt by everyone in the chapel. This Weekend came at a very critical time for the institution and Chaplain Harris. She is new to the facility and is trying to raise the level of spiritual awareness throughout the institution.

I believe that Warden Cook is committed to seeing Religious



Services regain its proper place in the institution. Prior to this Kairos Weekend the feeling inside was that Religious Services took a backseat to everything else. We were able to begin Prayer and Share grouping back in March (5 months prior to the first Weekend) with Kairos graduates who had been transferred in from other institutions. The group of about 12-18 men met with 3-4 of us each Wednesday. These men were hungry for Kairos and were very enthusiastic. They all mentioned the youth of the institution and their desire to bring these young men to a better understanding of the Lord. This core group of Kairos graduates (10 of them) served as servants for the entire Weekend. They also can be credited with the remarkable success of this first Weekend.

The pieces fell into place. God was already there when our Kairos Team arrived. The only thing we had to do was present

the Weekend as it is laid out in the RED MANUAL. This Team did that. While the Team was a "two-humped camel" from an experience standpoint, the combination of spiritual focus during team preparation, and having a group inside the institution clearing a path, made this first venture a true "victory in Jesus" for the participants, for the institution, and for all of us who love Christ and believe that the Kairos method is solid and built for success. I truly feel blessed to have been a part of this. All for the glory of God!!

I know that all of you are aware that Team members should not receive "thanks" from the inmate participants; but that does not apply when gratitude is given to Team members outside a Kairos event, when they have conducted themselves as true and humble tools in God's tool chest. So, my friends, I am truly grateful to Jim and the Team God gave him to lead at Pickaway #1. I'm also grateful to Mike Nofzinger and Dave Dickinson for all the work they did in getting Pickaway started 18 months earlier.

Remember, we've always got hot coffee on the stove for you here in the office.

In the Mailbag

Since my Kairos experience in March, God has been working in my life so much. During my Kairos Weekend, I shared that I had a falling out with my parents and have had no contact with them since. We prayed about it on the Weekend and the Team members told me they would continue to pray for me.

On April 10th, 2004 I received a birthday card from my father and mother. Since then, I have had several letters from them and they are coming to see me. My children, whom I have not seen in 10 years, sent me a letter and pictures and said they forgive me and want to get to know me again. Praise God! I have been praying every day for contact with my parents and children. God has given me peace and purpose back in my life. I now have the inner peace I have not had since I was a child. Being a child of God is great!

A Little Bit of Kairos vs. No Kairos At All

Being tasked with getting our Advisory Councils in compliance with our new Program Manual, I have had many conversations. I often hear that a “little bit of Kairos is better than no Kairos at all”. On its face, the statement seems to make a good point. At least we’re operating inside of a prison and these men and women are participating in, what is supposed to be, the “most effective” prison ministry operating in the world today. What could possibly be wrong with that?

Let’s take a good look at the statement... When is a “little bit” of something better than the whole deal? Like maybe five steps instead of the Twelve Steps in AA? Or having three quarts of oil in your engine instead of the five quarts that the owner’s manual calls for? Cutting maintenance medications in half might aid ones budget, but it may harm your health, and if you’re doing a 70 foot rappel down a cliff, 40 feet of rope is not “close enough”. These things would be tragic, destructive or a waste of time. Would you agree that a “little bit of Jesus is better than no Jesus at all”? I believe that history shows us that a “little bit” of Jesus has been the root of every cult and anti-Biblical movement that has ever been founded (Jim Jones’ People’s Temple and

Koresh’s Branch Davidians come to mind). Jesus did not give us the option to incorporate His name into our ideas of how to reach God and control people in the process. If you are going to be a follower of Jesus then you take the whole package, servanthood, humility, self-sacrifice, obedience...etc.

The healthy “Christian Life” begins with a little bit of Jesus, but it unfolds to reveal so much more. Almost nobody just “gets it”. We learn “it” from being around people of faith who model and encourage and challenge us to succeed in this “Christian Life” we have chosen to pursue. In fact, as we grow closer to the Lord we come to realize just how amazing His wonderful grace really is!

In our Kairos ministry, we are dealing with broken people. Many are schemers and out to get whatever they can from any source they can. One of the realities we have come to understand is that inside the prison, the “church” is just one of the “safer gangs” to run with. Entry is simple, just attend one of the many evangelistic services that cycle thru the prisons regularly, walk the aisle or raise your hand and you’re “in”. There are enough jailhouse preachers and teachers in the population to keep them engaged for the duration of their time. Not all of the teaching they receive is sound or even Biblical and is usually

more about power and control than it is about individual spiritual growth. Certainly the idea of accountability and seeing each other succeed in their personal relationship is lacking and is often seen as a threat to whomever is leading the group. This often distorts their view of Church and Christians and soon after returning to the street they are back on “the corner” and back in “the system”.

The Kairos Weekend Program is unlike anything else the prisoner has ever seen or experienced in the prison’s Chapel. First, is the number of people that come and the time we spend with them. It says you matter! Some of these people are reminded every day that life is going on without them. No visits, no mail, free world friends that were always there for them are remarkably absent. Serving time is a special kind of hell, especially when you’re looking at the future, and hope is being replaced by anger, frustration and despair. The Kairos team acknowledges the reality of life in prison and unlike anybody else in their lives, we do our best to listen and accept them just as they are, LLLL!

The talks and meditations we give aren’t gentle. We challenge them as if we know them and care enough to cut through the masks and false fronts and get to the heart of the matter.

We are joyful but not happy (joy is the fruit of decision, happiness is situational), and since many of us also come from difficult backgrounds, they learn that what we have is available to them through Christ. Hope begins to emerge, as the possibility of a different kind of life presents itself. Rather than presenting a “classic salvation” message, we present the concept of “Friendship with God” explaining God’s desire for a relationship with us and doing everything to restore mankind to Himself. We use the three-legged stool to demonstrate the support mechanism (process) that makes the whole relationship develop and grow.

Working together at the tables and hearing and sharing opinions is something that is seldom done in the prison environment because it leads to fighting and polarization in the housing units. Prison is a place where you are surrounded by people, yet are totally alone.

Laughter and music break down walls as the Kairos participant is experiencing things that just don’t happen in prison. The forgiveness talks and wind-up on Saturday present a great challenge to obey and follow “in faith” the advice and encouragement of others (trusted strangers?). The prayers and encouragement received on Sunday help them embrace the reality that they are not alone in this and success is found in faithful friendships and accountability to one another. All of this happens in roughly 40 hours without re-

quiring anybody to walk an aisle or raise a hand. The participant is left with all of the tools and experiences to make a decision to follow Christ as a matter of choice, supported by a community of believers inside and outside the prison environment that are committed to see him/her succeed in their choice.

I have come to understand that a “Little bit of Kairos” is actually worse than none at all. The reason being, that we **bargain away our strengths in compromise**. What part of Kairos can you eliminate or embellish and still have Kairos? We’re the “most effective Prison Ministry” because of our Program. Our Weekend event can be described as a “doorway” to introduce the participant into vital “prayer and share” groups which will ultimately impact the entire prison

environment. It is **tailored** to awaken the spiritual needs of incarcerated individuals. Adding to, or removing from, the Program can only change the trajectory of the Weekend, causing it to miss the goal.

On page 7 of the Program Manual there is a great picture of how the Weekend unfolds as a pathway. If you want to end your Weekend journey at the end of the path then you must “stay on the path!” There is nothing in our program that is coincidental... every single part is calculated to break down walls and challenge long held beliefs and experiences to encourage the participants to make a decision to follow Jesus... not just out of the Chapel, but to follow him for the rest of their lives.



KAIROS TRAINING

AKT is for Kairos Inside, Outside and Torch volunteers who are in or will be in a Weekend leadership role, including Advisory Council or State Chapter positions, anywhere within the Kairos program. Advanced Kairos Training gives the what, who and why of the Kairos Inside ministry. Kairos policy requires that all weekend leaders must have attended AKT-Inside prior to leading a Weekend.

Principle Statements Concerning AKT

Expenses

1. All AKTs are essentially free to any and all attendees.
2. However, paying the expenses of an attendee for AKT should be borne by the sponsoring Advisory Council (or State Chapter Committee in certain hardship cases), just as it is done in meeting other Weekend expenses.
3. This means that all Advisory Councils should be budgeting, not only for the expense of conducting Weekends, but also for any AKT expenses deemed necessary for future Weekend Leaders or other attendees that the Advisory Council wants to attend.
4. If an attendee wishes to make a personal gift to help defray the costs of attending an AKT, he/she should make their donation directly to his/her sponsoring Advisory Council, and NOT to the State hosting the AKT.

The Advisory Council will make the payment to the hosting State, as in 2. above. Since an attendee's gift to the Advisory Council is a donation, it is subject to an affiliation fee due from the Advisory Council or State.

Be sure to bring your Kairos Manual. If you do not have one yet, extra copies will be available for purchase at the training. Musicians: Please feel free to bring your instruments with you.

Graduation Day

By a Kairos Grad

Today is a special day for everyone in this room. For some of you, this may be the goal you wanted to achieve. For others, maybe this is just the beginning. Regardless, each of you deserves congratulations for finishing what you have started.

I want to take a few minutes to tell you about some of the things I have been through in the last 20 years of being in prison, with the hopes that maybe it will inspire you to do more to ensure that you take advantage of every educational opportunity in your path. This truly is your time.

Surely all of you are aware of the economic problems going on in the streets; how hard things are on your families, etc. We are able to feel some of the impact in here through budget cuts, prison closings, education, even our food. I saw in the papers a few weeks ago that they're even going to cut money for our clothes. My point is that times may have been hard before we came to prison, but they are even worse now. Even people with college degrees are having problems finding jobs. Because of the fact that we are all convicted felons, we are really going to have to struggle to find work of any kind. Our options are going to be very limited. All of us are seeing guys get out and come right back. Education can help break the revolving door.

I know a lot of you personally. All of us have different amounts of time to serve before we can return to society. I hope that not one person in this room returns to prison. For those of you who don't know me, this is my story. When I was 18 years old, I was on top of the world. I honestly thought I knew it all. Prison was the farthest thing from my mind. Things were so different than they are now. MTV was all videos. Cell phones were huge - I had one that was like a suitcase. Nintendo had just come out. The internet didn't exist for general population besides colleges and the military. I can't even express how much things have changed. One night in my life, everything changed. The next day I was in jail.

Six months later, I was standing before a judge, being told I was going to prison for life. Behind me the courtroom erupted; my family and friends screaming, my mom fainting. Officers came from everywhere and in a daze I was moved through the courtroom and out a door. I was placed in a car and on my way to prison.

I was taken to Polk Youth Institution in Raleigh. 730 youths cramed into a place built for half that number. The bunks were stacked 3 high, so close together you could touch the man next to you. Unless you were on the top bunk, you had to pray that you didn't get a really big guy on top of you because the springs were so bad he would hang down so

low that you couldn't turn over. I arrived in the middle of the night, my suit was taken and I was issued prison clothes and a bedroll and sent to a block.

Before I could unroll my mattress, I was in a fight. My first day in prison began in the hole. It was one of many such days to come.

In the beginning, it wasn't possible for me to imagine doing 20 plus years in prison. After several more fights, I began to accept that this new world was my home. I began to try to find things to occupy my time. There was an opening in Barber School - I took it and somehow managed to graduate. I honestly wasn't thinking of the future over the next few years as I signed up for one class after another. I was thinking about the time it would get me out of the block and the party when I finished, watching a movie and eating pizza. I never really thought that one day I would need any of this stuff. Fights were breaking out and riots, more drama than you can imagine, unless you were actually there. I was stabbed a couple of times in those early years. Honestly though, I really didn't care if I lived or died.

My educational experiences became the time in between trips to the hole. In 1995, I managed to get in enough trouble to be sent to MAX at Central Prison in Raleigh. Up until this point, my time in the hole had been days, weeks, if I really screwed up, maybe months. This time it was different. It was a nightmare that

lasted for 4 ½ years. The only positive was that I was part of the Outreach program through UNC-Chapel Hill and taking correspondence courses. Even this came to an end. One day I got a letter telling me that I had too much time to be in the program, under the new guidelines.

I was lost for the next few months. I didn't have anything really constructive to occupy my mind. I was already reading a lot, but at this point, I went into over-drive. I started ordering \$75

worth of books a month about every subject under the sun. I had people sending me newspapers from all over the world. I began writing letters to anyone who would respond. I wrote a lot of poetry, dark and depressing as I was. I sketched everything you can imagine and sent these pictures to my pen pals. Basically, I tried to focus on anything to take me away from the agony that had become my world.

MAX at Central Prison back then was the end of the road. It's

where they sent the Death Row guys who got in trouble on the Row; the too-violent for Mental Health Unit patients. It was the place they sent the people who thought they were too dangerous for regular population. In my years there, I watched as guys truly lost their minds, at one point, I was one of them. My aunt had told me about this drug called Paxil, and said that I ought to see a psychologist and see if I could get it. So began a few years of mental health treatment. Before you know it, I was taking several different kinds of medication for depression. I was happy though.

Presbyterian Women Conference Promotes Kairos

The Presbyterian Women's Gathering was a world-wide gathering of all the Presbyterian Women in Kissimmee Florida. It was a place to gather and exchange ideas and meet new people from all over the world. There were several workshops, trips and much information about the transient workers and their plight. Finally, it was a place of worship where all the women came in unity to worship God.

It was a fulfilling and enjoyable experience and one that many will not forget. Each of the Synods (area groups of the Presbyterian Church) met with their own Synods for lunch on Saturday. The Synod of Lincoln Trails (Indiana and Illinois area) invited Kairos representatives Brenda Campbell, Torch Administrative Assistant and Laura Roll, volunteer, to speak about Kairos and how they could become involved with the Kairos Prison Ministry.

Finally in 1999, I returned to regular population. I returned to everyday life in prison, got another job cutting hair and got a few visits where I was actually able to touch my people instead of just looking at them through glass. But I only managed to stay out of trouble for 9 months before returning to MAX for 2 ½ more years. I got off in 2002 and returned to a population that had changed drastically. Yet, one thing was for sure, I didn't want to return to MAX!! For the next couple of years, I just did time. Every once in a while I might hear about a class that I was interested in, but figured, oh, I'll take it later on. In 2004, I realized that I was a grown-up and decided it was time I started acting like it. I did the unthinkable and cut my hair. This was a big deal for me. I talked to my psychologist and tried to explain that I was ready to stop taking anti-depressants which for me were

just a crutch. I stated trying to be a better person in small ways. I was far from perfect, but I actually put forth an effort to stay out of trouble. It wasn't until 2008 that I actually began to think that I might be able to get out of prison one day. I realized that I had been in prison for almost 20 years. This was a new thought for me.

A couple months later, I went through Kairos at Alexander. It was the most powerful, life-changing experience I ever had in prison. Shortly after that, I was sent here. Kairos had fired me up to be an even better person. Here, of course, I got a job cutting hair. It's what I do and time passes. As it passes, I begin to think more about the future. What am I going to do when I get out? Truth be told, I'm not that scared. I mean, I can always cut hair. Every once in a while I'll see a poster on the wall about a new class here. A while back I asked about a Spanish class, but you had to be 35 years or younger to get in. I told her I'm only a few years past that. Surely they can make an exception. She said, "No, I'm sorry. Doesn't it suck getting old?"

After all the time I've done in prison, the last of my teens, all of my 20's, all of my 30's, I can honestly say that it is a shame. When I think about how I could have done things differently, the classes I could have taken, etc. It truly bothers me. So many friends I've seen get out of prison and come right back, over and

over. I've listened to their stories, of how hard things were out there and I can't help but wonder will it be like that for me? So many times I've heard, "I'll never come back!" Too many times they do.

I hope that each and every one of you take advantage of what educational activities we have left. Don't just do time, but do something with it that will give you more than one option when you do get out. The fact that you are here proves that you can do whatever you set your mind to do.

Mercy is something that touches us all during our lives. Sometimes we don't recognize it. Even worse is when we take it for granted. I looked up mercy in a dictionary and was shocked by what I found: Mercy is compassion shown to an offender; also imprisonment rather than for 1st degree murder. It is also a blessing result-

ing from Divine favor or compassion; a fortunate circumstance; and compassion shown to victims of misfortune."

All of the definitions touch me, but it was the second one that really blew me away; imprisonment rather than death for 1st degree murder. I've lived this for so many years. Was this mercy? How could this be in the dictionary? In a world with cases like Casey Anthony, who was just found not guilty of anything really serious, it makes us question so much about life; the rights and wrongs of things. For most of us in prison we realize that we did wrong and are paying the price to society. I always thought of mercy as something special, but I never considered my time to be mercy.

It sure didn't feel like mercy all those years ago when I stood before that judge. I was wrong – today I thank god for His
